

MEANING OF THE FOLDED FLAG

Have you ever noticed that the honor guard pays meticulous attention to correctly folding the Flag of the United States of America 13 times?

The 1st fold of the flag is a symbol of life.

The 2nd fold is a symbol of the belief in eternal life.



The 4th fold represents the weaker nature, for as American citizens trusting in God, it is to Him we turn in times of peace as well as in time of war for His divine guidance.

The 5th fold is a tribute to the country, for in the words of Stephen Decatur, 'Our Country, in dealing with other countries, may she always be right; but it is still our country, right or wrong.'

The 6th fold is for where people's hearts lie. It is with their heart that they pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with Liberty and Justice for all.

The 7th fold is a tribute to its Armed Forces, for it is through the Armed Forces that they protect their country and their flag against all her enemies, whether they be found within or without the boundaries of their republic.

The 8th fold is a tribute to the one who entered into the valley of the shadow of death, that we might see the light of day.

The 9th fold is a tribute to womanhood, and Mothers. For it has been through their faith, their love, loyalty and devotion that the character of the men and women who have made this country great has been molded.

The 10th fold is a tribute to the father, for he too has given his sons and daughters for the defense of their country since they were first born.

The 11th fold represents the lower portion of the seal of King David and King Solomon and glorifies in the Hebrews eyes, the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.

The 12th fold represents an emblem of eternity and glorifies, in the Christian eyes, God the Father, the Son and Holy Spirit.

The 13th fold, or when the flag is completely folded, the stars are uppermost reminding them of their Nations motto, 'In God We Trust.'

After the flag is completely folded and tucked in, it takes on the appearance of a cocked hat, ever reminding us of the soldiers who served under General George Washington, and the Sailors and Marines who served under Captain John Paul Jones, who were followed by their comrades and shipmates in the Armed Forces of the United States, preserving for them the rights, privileges and freedoms we enjoy today.

Did you know that at military funerals, the 21-gun salute stands for the sum of the numbers in the year 1776?



DID YOU KNOW?

- The Empty, or Vacant, Chair ceremony dates back to 1875, a decade following the end of the American Civil War. The first Mason honored by this U.S. program was a British Freemason who was killed in action in the U.S. Army of the Northern Plains. John Holt Beever is the first known Mason to give his life in uniform in service in the region then known as Dakota Territory. At first, the ceremony was used in Masonic Lodges to pay tribute to those who did not return from the war. Since then, it has been used by many lodges at Remembrance Day to pay homage to those Brother Masons who fell during WWI, WWII and other wars.
- The town of Keystone, near Mount Rushmore in South Dakota, was named by a gold prospector in 1877 for his York Rite Chapter watch charm.
- The term "profane" also has a unique usage in a Masonic Lodge to describe non-Masons by Masons. It is also the root of the word "profanity", which is why non-Masons will think this is an insult. It is not. Accepted as the word is for general use among Freemasons, its ancient meaning "outside the Temple, an outsider," may be misunderstood.
- In Christchurch New Zealand, there are two naturally eroded stone pillars standing at the entrance to Tumbledown Bay. Looking from the land, the one on the left is named Boaz and the other on the right is named Jachin. Leads one to believe that the founders were indeed members of the Craft.




SOCIAL NIGHT


