

DID YOU KNOW?

- Charles Darwin was a Freemason. Darwin became a Freemason in Scotland, and his grandfather and son also were Freemasons.
- Freemasonic symbols are usually regarded as existing because of the secrecy of the Fraternity. However, in reality, Freemasonry started being illustrated by symbols because at the very beginning most Freemasons could not read, so the symbols served to remind the members of the teachings of the Fraternity.

- The Grand Master of Massachusetts commanded rebels at Bunker Hill while the Grand Master of England commanded English forces.
- Most people are aware of the fact that the Statue of Liberty was a gift of the French people after their own republic came into existence.
