Masonic Education: Spreading the Word

The other day, I was at church when an acquaintance pointed at my ring and whispered, "Is that the Illuminati?" He was completely serious.

I replied, "No, it's Freemasonry."

He leaned in closer and whispered, "Is that like the place down the street, the Masonic Lodge with the big Square and Compasses and the light-up scrolling sign that shows upcoming events?

I confirmed, "It's exactly like that place. But you don't have to whisper about it; they know they're there."

He responded, surprised, "But I thought it was a big secret." I clarified, "Well, not really..."

I mentioned the prominent emblem on their building and explained the distinction between not being a secret society and being a society with secrets. I pointed out that many organizations have secrets; even doctors have confidential information.

He then asked, "So a lot of them are doctors..." He a bit out of touch with "things".

On another occasion, a woman from church whispered to my wife, asking, "Isn't Masonry all about demonic worship? I'm concerned your husband is involved...." Later, when I spoke to her and explained that most of our ritual is Old Testament, her follow-up question was, "Well don't the Catholics have a problem with Masons?"

We encounter many people who are completely misinformed about Freemasonry. It's crucial to be a positive role model whenever possible. I try to have a calm controlled demeanor in all things, and as I

get older, that seems to become easier. I talk to people about Faith, Hope, and Charity and how Freemasonry embodies those values. I try to dispel their misconceptions. When someone mentions a relative who was a Mason, I always say, "He must have been a really good guy." Usually, they agree.

Sometimes, this opens the door to further conversation. It's so essential that you spread accurate information about Freemasonry when you're out in the world. We are Freemasonry's ambassadors. We need more of that.
